Well, we have reached a turning point in our efforts to learn Vivaldi's wonderful Gloria! There have been many positive points from our rehearsals lately, not the least being that I sense that the music is beginning to have an infectious effect on many choir members. You are beginning to take ownership of it! I have witnessed the delight on the altos' faces as they nail the major third endings in a couple of movements, the beaming faces of the basses as they proudly declaim the opening theme of Cum Sancto Spiritu, the tenors as they announce that 'they are getting it', and, of course the sopranos who are dazzling us as ever with their sparkling sound.

I personally try to be passionate about everything that I do in life, and nowhere is this more relevant than with music performance. So, can I ask choir members to strive for this same passionate approach? You will find that it will take you along for the ride of your life! Find out what a choral society is all about and read about what other choirs are doing, Widen your listening experiences to embrace the masterpieces of the choral repertoire, as I suspect that many of you are not aware of this genre, even though you belong to a choral society!



Meet a choir member – Susan Davies

My early life in Wales - as told to the Editor

My early life was spent in the mountains and valleys of Wales where coal mining cast a dusty shadow. I was born Susan Rogers in 1947 at a place called Llwynypia. When I was 6 weeks old my family moved to Stanlytown, with the nearest city being Cardiff, 30 kms to the south east. My childhood was a happy time and my 3 younger siblings and I lived in the local pub, a large 2 story building run by my parents. Dad, apart from being a publican was also a miner. I have many pleasant memories of that time, particularly the singing and the beautiful voices of the miners in a smoky pub on a Saturday night. My Dad bought the first TV set in the town and I remember being dressed up and watching the Coronation with the rest of the townspeople who had been invited.

I attribute my love of singing to those early days. Winters were cold and when the snow came sheets of cardboard made excellent if unsafe toboggans down the valley. My school was alongside the mine, but this is now long closed and the valley has returned to its original green landscape. I later lived in Gilfach Goch, the valley that was depicted in the novel 'How Green was my Valley'. We eventually moved to Newport where I met Tony and in 1982 Perth became our home. My life continues in Mandurah.

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Singing for Parkinson's

I have been living with Parkinson's (PD) for nearly 10 years and belong to the Peel Speech Therapy Group. Some people with PD have problems with their voices and can lose the ability to speak entirely. Our self help group seeks to improve this outlook in a number of ways, one of which is singing.

Up to 9 people attend our group each month and we are lucky enough to have a guitarist and a couple of good voices (one of which is from your MCCS) to lead this part of our therapy which is so important to us.

Singing with music puts me in a happy mood and we have all benefitted enormously with improvement in our voice projection, breath control, self confidence and communication. I feel that speech therapy teaches us how, and singing puts the therapy into action.

German Apple Cake

Prep 15 min | Cook 55 min | Serves 12

INGREDIENTS

2 eggs

3/4 cup vegetable oil

- 1 ½ cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup wholemeal flour
- 1 cup white self raising flour
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 cups peeled chopped apples

DIRECTIONS

- 1. In large bowl, beat eggs and oil until smooth.
- 2. Add next 6 ingredients and mix well.
- 3. Fold in apples.
- 4. Pour into greased 9 by 13 cm pan.
- 5. Bake at 180° C for 50-55 minutes.



Boronia is here again


Boronia Is Here Again is now officially MCCS's own song. Words and music have been donated by member Phil Bodeker, who composed the piece for Boronia Week in Perth in 1999.

Written for the Nedlands' Primary School Choir, and sung in public for the first time at a Forrest Place launch, it was not sung again until presented by MCCS at the Nannup Flower Festival in spring last year.

Phil and his wife Janice grew boronia commercially on their 16 acre Dwellingup property from 1994, and for three consecutive years supplied the Kings Park Flower Show, as well as florists in Perth, Pinjarra, Dwellingup and Mandurah. Words for the ANZAC version to the same music now also belong to MCCS.
