

Meet a Choir Member Bronwyn Jones

I was born at the Turks Head Pub in Bromsgrove Worcestershire UK, towards the end of WW 2. Aged 3, my family relocated to another pub, in Blackpool. A wonderful childhood, loved school, enjoyed the beach and winter storms, went on picnics to the Pennines and Lake District; a fond memory is of lying in bed Christmas Eve, waiting for Santa and hearing the local Salvation Army Band playing in the lounge bar beneath my bedroom. I was regarded with some suspicion by my childhood friends at Sunday school as my father was a publican, a position coupled in the Bible with sinners! I had fun helping Dad in the cellar, tapping the old wooden beer barrels, straining dregs and topping up; Smiths Crips came in big tins, and the paper bags held small blue salt packets. My Mum made sandwiches for the domed glass platter on the bar counter. Made with rabbit but always labelled as chicken, they seemed very popular. The smell of beer, smoke and fresh bread evoke strong memories.

1953 was an epic year, Blackpool won the FA Cup, and I sat on the pub wall as the charabanc carrying the team and the cup passed by in procession; we all congregated around a hired TV in the public bar to watch the Coronation of Elizabeth 2nd and received news of the conquering of Everest a few days before.

Aged 18 I commenced four years nursing training at Manchester Royal Infirmary, 12 months of Midwifery training followed in Guildford Surrey, where I met and married my husband, Mike. He was on the rebound from the Royal Navy (He says from one institution to another!).

We bought a house in Slough, Buckinghamshire, had two wonderful boys and following a horrendous gas bill migrated to Australia as Ten-pound poms, arriving on the Fairstar in Fremantle July 1970. A wonderful decision never regretted.

We settled in the Northern Suburbs, I returned to nursing at Royal Perth Hospital, then at Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital. In 1985 I became a Nurse educator at Edith Cowan University. I completed a Bachelor of Nursing and Masters degrees at Curtin Uni and then a Doctoral degree at Murdoch Uni. Teaching, research, writing, graduate student supervision and administration along with extensive professional related travel, and all the activities of raising a family kept me busy for the next 30 years.

Preparing for retirement from my position as Professor and Dean of Nursing at ECU we moved to Mandurah in 2005. I joined the Mandurah City Choral Society in 2007, my experience of singing had been sporadic activity as a member of the Gilbert & Sullivan Society and a passion for listening to opera. Joining the committee and the kindness and friendship of other choir members have led to a very satisfying few years of membership for me.

Now my life is filled with my volunteer work with The Cancer Council of WA, as a volunteer at Peel Health Campus and as a sessional member of the State Administrative Tribunal; I read, do some writing, embroidery and knitting. Our three musically talented granddaughters make sure I have increased my music theory knowledge, tune my ukulele, keep us busy attending school concerts and create our Christmas specials!
